

<b>Fruit</b>	<b>Harvest Time</b>	<b>Usage</b>	<b>Notes</b>
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**Muscadines** Plant close to 20 ft apart, with rows 12 ft apart

<b>Carlos</b>	Early Fall	<b>Juices &amp; jams</b>	<i>High yield; medium-size berry; high vine vigor and good winter hardiness.</i>
<b>Cowart</b>	Mid-Fall	<b>Fresh eating, juices &amp; jams</b>	<i>Medium-large fruit; moderate vine vigor, good pollinator</i>
<b>Scuppernong</b>	Mid-Fall	<b>Fresh eating, wines, jellies, juices</b>	<i>Greenish/bronze, large, female - one of the oldest varieties</i>
<b>Southern Jewel</b>	Late Summer	<b>Fresh eating, wines, jellies, juices</b>	<i>Deep purple-black fruit, thick skin.</i>
<b>Southern Home</b>	Mid to Late-Fall	<b>Fresh eating, juices, &amp; jellies</b>	<i>Known for its juicy, rounded, black fruit.</i>

**Grapes** Plant close to 20 ft apart, with rows 12 ft apart

<b>Blanc du bois</b>	Mid-Summer	<b>Fresh eating, juices &amp; jams</b>	<i>White (light green) grapes. Heat tolerant.</i>
<b>Black Spanish</b>	Late Summer	<b>Juices, jellies, wines</b>	<i>Heavy, regular producer. Resistant to disease.</i>
<b>Champanele</b>	Mid-Summer	<b>Fresh eating, juices, &amp; jellies</b>	<i>Large, black fruits. Vigorous grower, disease resistant.</i>

**Blueberries** 8' to 10' apart - All are rabbit-eye

<b>Climax</b>	Early Summer	<b>Fresh eating, baking &amp; cooking</b>	<i>Large to medium sized berries.</i>
<b>Premier</b>	Early Summer	<b>Fresh eating, cooking, baking, freezing, preserves, jams</b>	<i>Large berry. Ideal for market.</i>
<b>Woodard</b>	Early to Mid-Summer	<b>Fresh eating, baking, cooking, preserves</b>	<i>Large, silvery, slightly tart berries.</i>

**Blackberries** Plants should be spaced two to three feet apart in rows eight to twelve feet apart.

<b>Ouachita</b>	Early Summer	<b>Fresh eating, freezing, baking</b>	<i>Heavy yields. Firm berries. Heat tolerant.</i>
<b>Arapaho</b>	Early Summer	<b>Fresh eating, baking, preserves, syrups</b>	<i>Medium sized. High quality, firm. Hardy against disease</i>

**FRUIT TREE TIPS:**

	<b>BARE-ROOT</b>	<b>CONTAINER</b>
<b>When to plant</b>	Winter	Anytime (summer not preferable)
<b>Best size to buy</b>	3 to 5 ft tall	Between 1g to 5g
